

The London Design Festival is back from 14-22 September. Much of the action focuses on Clerkenwell in the east and the V&A and 100% Design in west London, so **Yvonne Courtney** has put together a handy guide to the best events in these two creative hotspots...

100% Design

18-21 September 2013 London's landmark design fair. 100% Design is a must-visit for anyone working in or interested in contemporary design. The interiors show is now in its second year under new owners Media 10 (the company behind Clerkenwell Design Week, Grand Designs Live and The Clerkenwell Post) and is expected to attract over 30,000 visitors. This year's stellar line-up of speakers includes architects Richard Rogers, Eric Parry and Nigel Coates, plus furniture design legend Giulio Cappellini. Exhibitor highlights include: The Super Design Market This new shopping area in 100%'s interiors section will feature ceramics, textiles, glassware and plastics. Items on sale include everything from Kaaita's chic Hendee XL laundry bag to Kwamecorp's Josiah Wireless Speaker, and will reflect key trends and techniques in small scale and mass production design.

The Dinner Party at the V&A

14-22 September The London Design Festival joined forces with the V&A in 2009 and its installations and events seem to get ever more daring and intriguing, One highlight this year is The Dinner Party, which invites visitors to interrupt a deserted dinner gathering, the music still playing softly. The Norfolk House Music Room in the British Galleries will provide a theatrical backdrop for this seemingly lived-in setting, with contemporary tableware from Dutch studio Scholten & Baijings contrasting against the French-style panelled interiors. Burns on Seats at Ally Capellino West

Accessories designer Ally Capellino brings her aesthetic to the iconic British-made tubular stacking chair. Using the premise 'Bums on Seats', Capellino looks at the way we position ourselves while seated -'left leaning' or 'knees up' for example. She has designed variations on this theme, adapting the chairs with materials and techniques used in her signature leather bags. She's also produced a film referencing the 1957 Oscar-winning short 'A Chairy Tale' with long-time collaborator Donald Christie and a Burns on Seats' installation with Rupert Blanchard, which will be shown at Capellino's shop in Notting Hill. EC1-based architect Eric Parry established his award-winning practice in 1983. He has since been President of the Architectural Association and is renowned for his empathy for London's dense urban fabric. Ahead of his talk at September's 100% Design, he talks to Yvonne Courtney about craft, ceramics and a special community project right in the heart of Clerkenwell...



Is Clerkenwell a good place for an architect to be?

It's spectacular. Not because it's rarefied, but more because of the St Luke's Church and Barbican axis, and Whitecross Street and its street market running between the two. It gets better every day.

When and why did you move your firm towards Old St? We were in Saffron Hill before moving to Banner Street nine years ago. As the rents went up, we went with the rental flow. We're deeply embedded in the area.

What do you like most about Clerkenwell – do you have a favourite building?

I have a love/hate relationship with the Barbican towers [Parry lives in the adjacent Golden Lane Estate] which are rather like a Max Ernst petrified forest. My favourite building has to be St Luke's and its Hawksmoor obelisk.

What project are you most proud of?

Our community and social project at The Charterhouse. In partnership with the Museum of London and with funding by the Heritage Lottery Fund, this will see parts of the site opened to visitors and schoolchildren for the first time in its 642-year history. It's a living museum and a privilege to work on. The project involves the redesign of Charterhouse Square, creating a new entrance and museum facilities and refurbishing some of the existing rooms. Are events like 100% Design important to the industry? There was a big gap before 100% Design was launched. 100% Design reflects London's growing creativity – it stands for something important. It has gathered pace and gives impetus and focus to the showrooms. It's so exciting seeing all the new products.

What is your involvement with 100% Design?

I will be giving a talk exploring the ceramic buildings in Iran and the Topkapi Palace in Istanbul, and exploring the relationship between colour and texture through the crafting of artificial surfaces as seen in our projects such as the silk-screened transfer technique at Eagle Place in Piccadilly and the over-glazes at the Holburne Museum of Art in Bath.

ARCHITECTURE IS IN A STRONG PERIOD FRESH AND INNOVATIVE

Do you think architecture and design is going through a strong period? Does the industry need more support? Architecture is in a strong period – fresh and innovative. I'm preoccupied with what can lift architecture above building. There's a sense that industry dominates building. We need to get architecture embedded into industry.

You have designed a bench – do you have any more furniture design plans or collaborations in the pipeline? That was shown at Clerkenwell Design Week and yes, it marks a focus on product design and the start of a series including fabrics and ironmongery. Getting involved with traditions that are all but dead which, as a designer, I can help resuscitate by showing how

materials can be used in a contemporary way. Craft matters.

Eric Parry's talk Ceramics - The Crafting of Artifice in association with Turkishceramics takes place at 100% Design, Earls Court on 18 September. 100% Design is officially the UK's largest design trade event with over 25,000 visitors including architects, interior designers, retailers and designers. The event is held from 18-21 September and is the biggest event during the London Design Festival. www.100percentdesign.co.uk

Why two award-winning Clerkenwell constructions represent a new breed of London buildings...

326 Downstairs is a new addition to the offices of architects Bennetts Associates in St John Street. It's the final phase in a 12-year project to upgrade the 18th Century barn that houses this very modern design practice, and it recently won Best Office Design at the 2013 New London Architecture (NLA) Awards.

The barn once provided shelter to livestock before being driven down to Smithfield for sale or slaughter. When Rab and Denise Bennetts discovered the building it was near collapse. They restored it to form the 'hub' of their practice, with exposed brickwork and airy open-plan offices. Bennetts
Associates sees bringing redundant buildings back into re-use as key to reducing the carbon footprint of building.

Another local winner in the NLA Awards was Clerkenwell Close-based architect Amin Taha - best known in the area for his wonderfully gutsy, rusting cladding for Gazzano House on Farringdon Road. The judges were impressed by Taha's conversion of 115 Golden Lane, originally workshops for clockmakers and button manufacturers. It is now home to Jefferson Hack, co-founder of Dazed and Confused, and his MAD Agency. The architects stripped out all recent additions partitions, suspended floors and ceilings - leaving the exposed brickwork and large high-ceilinged spaces.

These two buildings epitomise the historical changes that have taken place in Clerkenwell; from rustic and industrial use to centre of the burgeoning creative economy. They also represent a key aspect of new architecture in London — the confidence to bring together cutting-edge design and traditional architecture to create environments that reflect the best of both worlds.
